### Autonomous Vehicle Self-Certification Testing Program

### **Report Requirement**

House Bill 2676, enacted during the 2020 legislative session, requires the Department of Licensing (DOL) to submit an annual report to the legislature summarizing the information reported by self-certifying autonomous vehicle testing entities under RCW 46.92.010.

This report also contains background information and the self-certification program requirements.

## **Background Information**

Created through Executive Order 17-01 and RCW 46.92.010, the Department administers the Autonomous Vehicle (AV) Self-certification Testing program, ensuring all testing entities meet the legal requirements before testing any autonomous vehicles on public roadways in Washington State. In addition to maintaining the self-certification testing program, DOL is also responsible for making publicly accessible any collision and moving violation reports submitted by the self-certified companies, as well as information about the intended testing locations.

# Self-certification testing program

Any company that plans to conduct, test, or operate an autonomous vehicle on the roads of Washington State must self-certify with the Department of Licensing.

Entities must meet the following minimum requirements prior to any testing:

- Complete a self-certification application with the Department prior to any testing.
- Maintain an umbrella liability policy of not less than \$5,000,000 per occurrence.
- Acknowledge they understand their requirement to report to law enforcement.
- Report to the Department their intended testing jurisdictions.
- Report to the Department any moving violations or collisions from the prior year (by February 1st each year)
- Must notify the respective law enforcement agencies in advance of testing.

Additionally, depending on the manner of testing planned, the below requirements must also be followed:

Testing <u>with</u> human operators present.	Testing <u>without</u> human operators present.
<ul> <li>Only a trained employee, contractor, or other person authorized by your company can operate or monitor the vehicles.</li> <li>You must monitor vehicles.</li> <li>An operator must have the ability to direct the vehicle's movement when it needs assistance.</li> <li>Anyone operating an autonomous vehicle needs a valid U.S. driver license.</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>You must equip vehicles with an automated driving system. It must perform all driving tasks on a part-time or full-time basis within their operational design limits.</li> <li>Vehicles must also be able to make it to a safe condition in the event of a system failure.</li> <li>Vehicles must follow all relevant Washington state motor vehicle laws.</li> </ul>

Per <u>RCW 46.92.010</u>, Section 6: there were **no** reportable collisions and zero moving violations during Calendar Year 2023. Please note that this requirement only pertains to companies testing SAE (Society of Automotive Engineering International's standard) Levels 4 and 5 self-driving vehicles.
